ADVERBS

> Most adverbs tell you how, where or when something is done. In other words, they describe the manner, place or time of an action.

Types of adverbs

Manner

- It describes in which manner an action is done.
- > The girls answered all the questions correctly.
- > He was driving <u>carelessly.</u>

Place

- It describes where an action is done.
- > The boys are playing <u>upstairs</u>.
- > The dog is <u>in the garden</u>.

Time

- It describes when an action is done.
- > We moved into our new house last week.
- > Our favorite T.V. program starts at <u>6'o clock</u>.

Frequency

- It shows how many times an action is done.
- > The children <u>always</u> go to school on the bus.
- > I'll <u>never</u> make that mistake again.

Degree

It shows how much or in what degree or to what extent.

- > He was <u>too</u> careless.
- > The sea is <u>very</u> stormy.
